The City officially accepted the "Belk Memorial Park" property in December 1953 after Robert E. Lee Belk donated a large tract of land. In 1956, the City commissioned Packard & Wadsworth Architects to propose plans for an eighteen-hole golf course. Construction of the 147-acre golf course began July 1, 1969 and the course opened for play on **August 1, 1970**. Updated Fees and Changes in Occupancy Ordinance

As of **November 4, 2019** the fee for the City to mow/maintain private property that has been neglected is a minimum of \$100 per hour per parcel, plus a \$60 Administrative Fee, as well as a court citation being filed on both the property owner and tenant/occupant. If you receive a letter for any property maintenance violation please **DO NOT** ignore it. Property owners are ultimately responsible for everything that happens on property they own including the alleyway. Educate your tenants/occupants so a bill and/or court summons does not show up in your mail. If you are a tenant/occupant please mow and weed eat in a timely manner and do not neglect the alleyway.

As of **November 18, 2019** the City's Occupancy Ordinance was updated. The complete ordinance is available at City Hall in the Clerk's office or online at woodriver.org on the Building and Zoning page. A few of the most important changes are:

- Head of Household (Occupant) and Owner/Owner's Representative must **BOTH** sign occupancy application.
- Copies of State IDs must be attached to the application for every occupant 18 years of age and over
- A copy of the current signed lease must be attached to the application
- Property Managers must submit an authorization letter on letterhead from the business/owner they represent as well as copies of 2 forms of ID (see entire ordinance for clarification on authorization letter requirements @ woodriver.org).

Personalized "Big Trash" Pick-Up

City-wide Spring and Fall Trash Pickups have been replaced by Personalized-On-Demand Twice-A-Year-Pickups. That's right! **YOU** call and schedule **YOUR** pickups on **YOUR** schedule, when **YOU** are ready! No missing the date. Each household gets two **FREE** pickups per calendar year. You must pre schedule by calling Republic Services at 618-656-6883.

Water/Sewer Billing & Finance Department 251-3131

If you are over the age of 62 or receiving social security, please bring your ID and/or social security award letter to the Water/Finance Department to see if you qualify for a penalty waiver.

Water bills can be paid online at woodriver.org or over the phone at 855-966-6582. Please see the City website for more information. You can also sign up for direct debit by bringing a voided check to the Water/Finance Department at City Hall.

Storage of Trash/Recycling Containers

City Code states waste and recycling containers are to be placed beside or behind the residence **within 24 hours** after the scheduled collection day.

Appearance Awards

The Appearance Board will be driving around town looking for homes and businesses that have made overall property enhancements. Appearance Awards will be given out every month at City Council meetings until September. If you know of someone deserving of this award, please contact City Hall at 251-3100.

Public Works:

6th Street Resurfacing Phase 2 is a rotomill and resurfacing project on 6th Street from Edwardsville Road to State Route 143. All intersections will be upgraded to handicap accessibility and there will be new striping for this length of the road. The project bid came in at \$400,000 which is \$100,000 under estimate. Project construction costs are covered 75% by the State and 25% by the County. Construction began March/April 2020.

COMPLETED Streetscape Phase 2 project was a continuation of the first Downtown Streetscape project and was set for completion at the end of April 2020. Phase 2 was on Ferguson from Old St. Louis Rd. to Wood River Ave. and from 1st St. to 2nd St. Project construction costs were covered 80% by the State and 25% by the City.

Wood River Avenue Phase 1 and 2 – This is a rotomill and resurfacing project on Wood River Avenue from East Alton City limits to Ferguson Avenue. All intersections will be upgraded to handicap accessibility and there will be new striping for this length of road. The project is under design and is tentatively set to bid June of 2021. The current construction cost estimate is \$1,000,000 and is covered 75% by the State and 25% by the County with construction to begin August 2021.

State St. Waterline Phase 1 project will install a new 12" water main on State St. between Harnett and Elble. The City is applying for a \$100,000 grant from Madison County Community Development. Project construction cost is estimated at \$200,000 covered 50% by the County and 50% by the City with construction to begin mid to late fall 2020.

State St. Waterline Phase 2 project will continue the new 12" water main on State St. and will run from Elble to Cotter and then continue to Haller. Project construction cost is approximately \$100,000 and expected to begin mid to late fall 2021.

Manhole Lining Phase 3 project will line approximately 75 manholes that are in desperate need of rehabilitation. The lining will re-establish structural stability within the manhole and stop them from leaking. Most of these manholes are brick and well over 80 years of age. Construction cost is approximately \$115,000.

Notes From the General Inspector

Clean up Alleys - City ordinances state it shall be unlawful for any owner or occupant of any premises to allow such premises or any right-of-way or sidewalk adjoining such premises, to be hampered by any growth of grass, weeds or bushes over a height of eight inches. Please remember to maintain your alley right-of-way, especially if you have a fence.

Keep it Short – Grass and weeds must be kept under 8" to comply with City ordinance. Let's help each other. If the City has to send you a letter and has to cut your grass, it ends up costing you a lot more than having it done yourself.

Vehicles parked on public and/or private property **MUST** be licensed and operable. If a vehicle does not comply, the City can have the vehicle towed at the owner's expense.

Parking in residential districts shall not be in any required front yard, except in a driveway. Parking may be located in the side or rear yard.

Recreational vehicles and utility trailers in residential districts shall comply with the following guidelines:

- Not more than one recreational vehicle or utility trailer on any lot.
- The parking of a recreational vehicle or utility trailer is allowed in the rear yard only.
- The parking of a recreational vehicle or utility trailer shall comply with the yard requirements for accessory buildings.
- The parking of a recreational vehicle or utility trailer shall not impede the light or air of a neighboring structure.

All of the above matters are Code violations and carry a fine of up to \$500/day.

Public Notice:

Holiday Schedule for Trash/Recycling Pickup

If the holiday falls on a Saturday or Sunday, there is no disruption in the pickup schedule. Should your pickup day fall on or after the holiday, your trash and/or recyclables will be collected one day late.

For example: Holiday falls on a Monday, then:

Monday route is picked up Tuesday
Tuesday route is picked up Wednesday
Wednesday route is picked up Thursday
Thursday route is picked up Friday
Friday route is picked up Saturday

Storm Clean-Up

Following a storm, the Street Department will haul away branches that have fallen. Please place the branches at the front curb and contact the Public Services Office at 251-3122.

Regular Brush Pick Up

Residents can schedule curbside brush/tree limbs to be picked up for a fee of \$50 per truckload. Arrangements and prepayment must be made in advance; call the Finance Dept. at 618-251-3131.

Deposits on Streets and Sidewalks

It shall be unlawful for any person, firm, or corporation to dump or deposit any grass, leaves, branches, gumballs, glass, nails or other similar articles, or any waste material on any public street, alley, or sidewalk in the City.

Solicitors

City ordinance regulates peddlers and solicitors in residential neighborhoods. Individuals going door-to-door are **required** to have a City license. Before a license is issued, the Police Department runs a background check on each individual for the safety and welfare of residents. Ask solicitors to see a city license. If they have no license or if the solicitor is acting undesirably, contact the police at 251-3114. Please remember a city license is in no way an endorsement of the firm or product. Established religious and charitable not-for-profit organizations are exempt from these regulations.

Yard & Garage Sales

Don't forget to get your yard/garage sale permit. They are **FREE** and can be obtained at the City Clerk's office Monday – Friday from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. Yard/garage sales are allowed two times a year with a duration not to exceed seventy-two (72) continuous hours. City code prohibits the placement of signs or advertising on utility poles, traffic control devices or anywhere in the public right-of-way. We appreciate your cooperation and good luck with your sale.

Games Interfering with Traffic—Prohibited

It shall be unlawful to play any games upon any street, alley, sidewalk or other public place where such games cause unnecessary noise or interference with traffic or pedestrians. This is particularly true about basketball hoops and should be limited to driveways only.

Fire & Police Department News

Our Men and Women in Uniform--Wood River's Finest

Fire Department

Office of the State Fire Marshall Encourages Illinois Residents to Purchase Approved Smoke Alarms (Excerpts as published in the Riverbender February 19, 2020).

Illinois law requires that smoke alarms in dwelling units are listed by an approved third-party testing organization.

According to the Act, every home or hotel must have at least one approved, operating smoke detector within fifteen feet of every room used for sleeping purposes as well as one inside each sleeping room. Further, the smoke detector must be installed on the ceiling at least six inches from any walls or can be installed on a wall located between four and six inches from the ceiling.

When purchasing a smoke alarm for your household, be certain that the smoke alarm has been approved by a third-party testing organization as some retail outlets may sell non-listed smoke alarms.

In 2018 there were 105 residential fire deaths with over 70 percent occurring in homes without smoke alarms. OSFM wants to make sure all Illinoisans are purchasing and installing approved alarms, so they have the best protection in their homes."

The Wood River Fire Department provides Life Safety Inspections for all residents and occupancies. Partnered with the Red Cross they provide smoke detectors to property owners in need, or otherwise determined appropriate.

Retirement:

Fire Chief Brendan McKee retired January 2020 with 23 years of service. He served as a Firefighter, Captain and Chief. During his tenure at the Fire Department Chief McKee was instrumental in maintaining a working relationship between the Fire Department and BP, Marathon and Kinder Morgan. He worked tirelessly to enhance the department's future through vehicle purchases, software upgrades and minimizing commercial false alarms.

Promotions:

Wade Stahlhut was promoted to Fire Chief in January 2020. Chief Stahlhut was a Paid-on-Call Firefighter for three years with the Wood River Fire Department before working at the Roxana Fire Department as a Firefighter, Deputy Chief and Chief for seven years. Chief Stahlhut was hired by Wood River in May 2005 and served as a Firefighter and Captain as well as a licensed Paramedic.



Nate Kamp was promoted to Captain in January 2020. Captain Kamp was also a Paid-on-Call Firefighter for three years with the Wood River Fire Department before working four years at the St. Louis City Fire Department. Captain Kamp was hired by Wood River in June 2009 and he is also a licensed Paramedic.

New Hires:


The City hired two Probationary Police Officers in 2019.

YOUTH PROGRAMS

2020 FALL SOFTBALL: Registration begins in June and the deadline is August 7. All leagues begin play during the first week of September.

ALCOHOLICS ANONYMOUS: Regular meetings are held at the 14th Street Shelter on Sundays from 10 a.m. to noon. Meetings are an excellent place to gain support, obtain helpful information about drinking problems or seek help for drinking problems. Everyone is welcome.

Both employees are to be commended for their outstanding service and dedication to the citizens of Wood River.


Life Saving Efforts:




